All CVWS members who have won any 2017-2018 ribbons can bring a painting to the April meeting. It does not need to be the painting that won the initial award Paintings will be awarded 1st & 2nd Place, Honorable Mention and People's Choice, (which will be voted on by attendees.)

Paintings should be delivered between 6:00-6:30 PM. They must arrive before 6:30 or they will not be considered. The judge, David Fairrington, will review the paintings between 6:30-7:00. While he is reviewing the paintings, attendees can wait in the lobby area. You're welcome to bring something to eat or drink to share with everyone. There will be a short business meeting at 7PM

**DAVID FAIRRINGTON** is our Painter of the Year judge for 2018.

Mr. Fairrington is an Internationally known artist who grew up in Texas and graduated from Texas Tech University. After graduating, David served as an "Army Combat Artist" for the Dept. of the Army in Vietnam. The paintings he did are now in the U.S. Army Center of Military History in Washington D.C.

David was named a "Master Artist" by "International Artist" magazine and his portraits are in private and corporate collections. David paints corporate officers, business owners as well as families and children. He also paints celebrity portraits; his most recent being portraits for ABC Television and the Disney Corp. His landscapes are in homes and county buildings in Southern California.

Sometimes referred to as a modern Degas, Fairrington has been commissioned to paint dancers from the School of American Ballet, New York City, NY, the New York City Ballet, NY, Westside Ballet Academy, Santa Monica, CA, The Studio Ballet, Fresno, CA, The Sacramento Ballet, Sacramento, CA and the Peninsula Ballet, Palos Verdes Estates, CA. His most recent painting was for the Miami Ballet, Miami FL.

Recent shows have been at the Edward-Dean museum in Cherry Valley, CA and Claremont, CA. David is an art judge and teaches painting and life drawing. He also conducts critique sessions at the Desert Art Center in Palm Springs and at the Threshold gallery in Redlands, CA

## **Member Profiles**



## Tips & Techniques


#### TIPS FOR YOUR WATERCOLOR PAINTINGS from Ron Hanner's 64 years of painting.


- 1. To straighten and make your finished painting flat again, toss it into a partly filled **bath tub** or a **swimming pool.** Carefully get both sides under the water. Lifting at the two short corners, let it drip drain for a minute, then carefully lay it face up on any flat surface. After about 45 minutes, flip it over onto another dry flat surface. Finally another flip or two until dry. No paint will come off other than at any place where it was accidentally disturbed. For your first courageous try, use a painting that isn't otherwise worth saving.
- 2. This is my **most important** tip. Always hold a small **damp sponge** in your left hand **at all times** during your painting. When you bring a loaded brush over your painting, invariably paint will drop onto your painting. It is imperative that you sponge them off **within seconds**. If left while you take time looking for your dry sponge in your paint box...the drop will have softened the dry paint underneath, and this will lift it too. An other-wise perfect painting can be ruined this way.
- 3. To lighten overly heavy areas of a painting, carefully use a light flow from your **garden hose** to soften those areas. Then use a soft wet brush on your chosen areas. Use a bristle brush if more vigorous treatment is wanted. Then rinse these areas with the hose. Use a stronger flow of water to blast away for stubborn, major lightening. You can also do this over the kitchen sink. But not in the bathtub, since there is less control of the faucet there.
- 4. To remove minor dry paint marks that have somehow gotten onto a fresh, unused sheet of watercolor paper. Brush on some water to soften it. Then use a clean, damp sponge and scrub as much of it off as you can. Then spritz on some household **Clorox**, and scrub it off with a clean sponge. Finally, spritz on some clean water and sponge it off for possible Clorox residue.
