Her interest in art began very early, as a child, drawing and painting. She attended San Diego State University where she completed her Bachelor of Arts Degree in Painting and Printmaking. Later on in life, Susan became a teacher and taught all levels of high school art.

Upon retiring from teaching Susan has pursued watercolor with a renewed love and interest. Her professional art career started in 2013, in which she began exhibiting her watercolor paintings publicly. Her work has been shown in local, regional, national and international shows where she has won various awards. Her work has been juried into the National Watercolor Society, California Watercolor Association, the San Diego Watercolor Society, Watercolor West, the Georgia Watercolor Society, the Louisiana Watercolor Society, Northwest Watercolor Society, Kentucky Watercolor Society, Illinois Watercolor Society, the Western Federation of Watercolor Societies, and the Society of Watercolor Artists.

Susan's watercolors have a sense or impression of realism. She incorporates bright colors in her paintings to catch the viewer's eye. She is intrigued by light and shadow in so many subjects; from foliage, florals, and still life, to plein air landscapes, architecture and portraits. Most days you can find Susan painting in her studio/gallery or on the look out for a beautiful subject that has found her attention to capture in watercolor.

Then I'll sign up again, and enter another painting. Some of you know that I submitted my work to Desert Art Center and was not accepted this year.

Our 29th Annual Show is in about 5 weeks. You have time to get ready. There are lots of options to share your paintings...several categories...framed or unframed. Get your work ready and invite your family and friends to our fabulous reception on January 31^{st.} Look for more information about it soon.



I love all styles of watercolor. My favorites are painting detailed patterns and textures, all in bright colors. My very favorite is painting flowers and leaves. It usually takes me a day to do a very detailed drawing. Once that is done the actual painting is not quite as intense. I guess you'd call my painting style realistic.

It's such a great feeling of accomplishment when I finish a painting I've designed myself. And if someone else likes it and buys it - that's even better!

Nancy Dion, a CVWS member since 1999, has dabbled in art all her life. Starting with pen & ink life drawing, tempura painting (for prom decorating) to illustrations for patient info pamphlets while an Occupational Therapist. Started watercolor after retirement and for the past year is experimenting with acrylics. Next: collage!

I'm Annette Fragasso. I've been a member of CVWS for several years. I am very appreciative of the opportunity the club provides for me both in showing my work and encouraging the creative process by the programs it offers.

I begin my paintings with a plan, using a small sketch to establish the composition then choose my colors. Lately I have been painting just two or three subjects several times, using both watercolor and acrylic. By familiarizing myself with a subject I find my technique improves.

A quote from my lifetime friend and artist, Carol Collins, "The act of painting involves observation, dreaming and playing. Our response to a painting stimulates our imagination and we experience a moment's respite from the practical world". So true, it's more fun













I, Jan (Julie) Jones, was an apple who fell from the tree and rolled away. In the process, I became an orange and occasionally, a lemon. Growing up in a small town, I spent my youth doing all the art work I could. After graduating from college

with a degree in design, I rolled to a large city. For thirty years, I worked as a commercial illustrator. Now, it is my turn to do the art work I want to do —what a blessing!

I love planning a piece of work, then moving forward, after using watercolors. The work never goes as planned — just like life! My work is not loose and has too many details. Sometimes I try to change those aspects, but sometimes I add even more detail! Watercolors are a wonderful way to express a variety of things—and they dry quickly. I don't think of any paintings as a failure: it's possible to learn from mistakes and poor choices. The only mistake, in my mind, is not trying again. Watercolor painting offers endless opportunities for personal expression. So I say, "Paint on, and have fun!"

Tips & Techniques

Perfection

The artist's usual form of Compulsive Perfection is the staunch enemy of fresh, spontaneous watercolor painting. But it's understandable since perfection comes in part from the survival of the species instinct. And it is extremely difficult to break from the tyranny of this natural drive. Where this comes into play is when our inclination demands that we paint exactly what we see at our painting site. Painting what we see is a huge **NO**, by the way. Improve on nature, paint a BETTER painting than what we see at the scene!

I've focused on this counter force for 63 years, and have just barely got it under control to consistently make a good painting. I'm getting closer, but they are not consistent yet. It's like hitting a jackpot when one works.

For crisp, fresh, spontaneous paintings, it is necessary to curb ones hard-handed perfectionist propensities that are led by the tyranny of nature. Without trying so hard, perfection will then come back in a different form with crisp, spontaneous paintings that other people will more enjoy looking at. But better yet, you will like them better too.


Deadline for mailed entry forms for the CVWS Annual show is January 24th.


Be sure to carefully read all the rules.
