Next is our Workshop with Tom Francesconi from the Chicago area...there are a few spaces left for you to join us! Tom was here several years ago and was so well received we invited him back! Any questions, please call me!

One of the decisions we must make as artists, is where and how to sign our paintings. There are several ideas; the most traditional think it should be done with a brush and watercolor. In the workshop I just took with Sterling Edwards, while he usually uses brush and watercolor, he said quite often he uses pencil. Some are not signing on the face of the painting, but on the sides of cradled board or canvas. Georgia O'Keeffe didn't think she had to—she thought people would be able to tell they were hers because of what she painted and how she painted it. She many times wrote on the back of the canvas on a label or on the stretcher. I wonder what you do!

I'm sad to share with you that we lost two of our members last month. Lois (Loey) Siering was a relatively new member. She won a ribbon in the December Painter of the Month, then went into the hospital for a short time, recovered enough to go home and emailed me that she missed getting her Annual Show Entry Form in time, and requested being allowed to enter late, which we gave her. She also had volunteered to demonstrate at the Show. However that was not to be. She had the joy of painting right up to her last on this planet.

The second member was Miss T (Imschweiler), one of our Charter and Life Members. She was always a cheerful and a willing contributor to the Board in several positions: as Publicity Chair, Special Activities Chair, and Field Mice Co-Chair. She was serious about her art and entered our show, usually winning a ribbon! As Special Activities Chair, she consistently came up with creative ideas for artistic shows, such as our Lantana Exhibit for the new Lantana Restaurant at the Indian Wells Hyatt Hotel, as well as many other outings and events. - 1. It's essential to keep a sketchbook. (He is working on his 96th!)
- 2. Favorite sketching pens are: Sanford Uniball Micro Pen, Pentel Sign pen (water soluble), and Pilot V-Razor point, extra fine.
- 3. Favorite brushes: Rosemary and Windsor-Newton Scepter brushes
- 4. Holbein paints
- 5. Draw your subject... those lines help ease that fear of blank white paper.

### **Tips & Techniques**

#### PAINTING LOOSER Kathleen Scoggin

Watercolor is hard enough, so lets talk about the things you can control. Below are things you can do easily if you are determined.

- 1. Paint half sheets or larger.
- 2. Use photographs as inspiration only, best not to copy exactly. Your sketchbook is your best source.

3. Draw simple sketches with sharpie on paper near the size of your watercolor paper. No details! Use no more than 5-7 simple shapes to portray the subject matter. I use butcher paper or starving artist newsprint. This warms you up and you determine the composition before painting. If the composition is not right, this is the time to make changes. If you are saving whites, now is the time to determine which shapes aren't going to be painted You can put another piece of butcher paper over the first drawing to simplify, change shapes or decrease the number of shapes for a better sketch.

4. Draw the shapes on your watercolor paper. I use a water-soluble pencil. Use black or colored as you wish. Yes, some of the drawing will go away as you paint. Keep it simple.

5. Choose 3-4 adjacent colors on the color wheel to start your painting. Be sure your paint is soft in your palette. Keep color choices simple to avoid having to stop and think about what color to use next. This will help your painting have harmony and unity. Don't worry if it's not the actual color of the subject matter. Come back later to adjust the value by glazing or adding a complimentary color.


6. Wet the back of your paper with a sponge or paintbrush. Wet the front with a spray bottle.

7. Use <u>no smaller</u> than a 1 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> inch flat wash brush to start your painting and use it long into the process or until the paper is dry. Most work with rounds and riggers is done after the initial wash is dry. 8. Now it is time to paint! Start with lightest color first. Cover at least 3 large areas of the paper. Don't worry about painting inside the shapes. Just lay in color. As you come in with your second color be sure that most of the paper is painted (except whites, if you have them). Be sure to overlap colors. They will blend well as you are using a color family. Apply at least three colors. Do not forget the edges and corners of the paper! The paints and water in the paper should be doing beautiful things. Let it happen. Do not over work!

9. At this point you can begin to paint shapes (positive) or around the shapes (negative). Get in there with lots of paint and you can begin to develop darker values. The paper will still be somewhat wet so you will be getting soft edges. Get as much of the painting done while paper is still damp.

10. When paper begins to dry, is the time to slow down the painting and do careful analysis of your painting. Put a working mat on it and step back a distance and take a good look

at it. After determining what it really needs, you can add some hard edges and paint a few finishing details. Now is the time to choose a smaller brush. Do not over work.
