She creates intuitively and spontaneously in a relaxed, natural way of expressing her individual emotional response to the subject or scene she paints. Her work is charged with the energy of her own life, her passion for people and nature. The inspiration for Stella's art comes from her appreciation of beauty and her positive view of the world. Stella prefers to introduce symbols, giving the viewers the opportunity to visualize the details. This way she strives to emotionally involve them as partners, to give them a feeling of ownership of the painting. She believes that art is a way of spiritual communication.

Stella was honored by Daniel Smith with two Stella Canfield's Artist Master Sets of her favorite colors and included in CEO John Cogley's one-on-one video interviews titled In the Artist's Studio. She was included in Life with John Cogley.

Today Stella teaches watercolor, juries and participates in exhibits initiated by art organizations in the USA, Europe and Asia. She has received many international awards for her work. Her paintings are in several private, corporate, and museum collections in America, Europe and Asia.

Stella's work and contribution to American art are published in the book by Karlyn Holman <u>Watercolor: The Spirit of Spontaneity</u>. Her biography is included in Who's Who in American Women.










President's Message

We just had a great demonstration at our January meeting from member Ellen Diederich. Her expressiveness and color selection were wonderful to watch.

Also at our January meeting was the start of the push leading up to our Annual Show in March. We had several donations (many, many thanks to those people who contributed). But we still NEED MORE. Our gift baskets are a major fundraiser for us so additional help is needed, including donations of such things as new art supplies, videos, candy, cheese and crackers, golf greens fees, art lessons, and, of course, wine!

In February our demonstrator will be Stella Canfield. Following that, she will teach a 3-day workshop at the Best Western Plus in Palm Desert on Highway 111. Stella is an internationally known watercolor artist who has judged and shown her work in exhibitions around the world. Her workshops are straight forward, tell it like it is, with humor and an incredible love of passing on her knowledge to her students. We are looking for 3-4 more students to fill the workshop and make it a truly outstanding experience. How about it? Do you want to improve your art and up your game? Then this workshop is for you. The cost is \$450 for 3 full days of learning, laughing and painting.

In March we will have the highlight of our season: our Annual Show. Ian Cooke and Mary Anne Brower have successfully, and profitably chaired past shows and provided a great four-day experience in the wonderful venue at the Artist Center at the Galen in Palm Desert. If you've never been to the Galen, it's a beautiful place to hold an exhibition. You can enter paintings into our show without fear of rejection because you don't need to be juried in. Besides the traditionally framed, open, plein air and mini paintings you can enter, there is an additional opportunity to sell up to eight (8) bin paintings, Please read the prospectus on the website www.cvws.org for all the rules and regulations as well as the pricing guidelines for your work. This year there are new minimums in the bin paintings and the framed paintings, so to make this show a financial success, please only place paintings in the bin that you would have framed for the show but couldn't because of the number of framed pieces you are limited to entering. Remember, paint, paint, and paint some more!

Also, we need to keep the push on to get new members.

Until next month, keep putting those "miles on the brush"!

"Show Off"

The Annual CVWS Show & Sale is just around the corner. It's our big chance to show off, strut our stuff and display the beauty of water media. However, it seems that no matter how carefully we prepare our paintings, inevitably we get to the check-in and find that there's a speck under the plexiglass, or an unnoticed blemish on the mat that sends us to the fix-it table. It's terribly frustrating to find there's something amiss after you've spent so much time not only creating something you're proud of, but also all the busywork of matting, framing, labeling, etc.

These glitches stop an entry in its tracks and cause undue stress. But there is a solution: carefully scrutinize your work BEFORE entry day. I know all too well how easy it is to simply not see flaws. And sometimes, even professional framers will fail to notice a speck of lint in a framed piece. Here are some suggestions:

- Complete your framing early. Then check it twice more before entry day. This sounds easy, but I find that
 unless I actually put these tasks on my calendar way ahead of time, I'll procrastinate and then it doesn't
 get done as I intended.
- 2. Have another set of eyes go over every inch with a fine-toothed comb. It's too easy to overlook our own mistakes, so buddy up with an artist friend and check each other's work. Also, double check your labels/entry forms for consistent titles, prices & categories. You'd be surprised how many times these don't match on entry day.
- 3. Stock some extra mats, plexiglass, and frame parts (if you do your own framing) and bring them to checkin, in the event you need to change out anything. Better to have them at the ready in the car, rather than to have to go back home or be without replacements at all.
- 4. If you have bin paintings, bring extra cellophane bags in case there's a rip or smudge that doesn't pass inspection.
- 5. If you use a professional framer, carefully inspect your painting BEFORE you leave the shop.

Your beautiful creations deserve a pristine, professional presentation, so take special care. They represent much more than just ideas and paint to us...they are a part of our soul, and they should reflect us at our best.

Can't wait to see them.


Bonnie Moy








CVWS ANNUAL SHOW March 2025

Entry Deadline: Online by Feb. 19th, or by mail to CVWS, P.O. Box 565, Palm Desert, CA, before Feb. 17th.



Intake is planned for Tuesday March 4. The evening reception on Thursday the 6th from 5-7pm.

The show will be open to the public and for sales from Thursday the 6th to Sunday the 9th.

General hours are 10am to 4pm (3pm on Sunday).

Pick up will be on Sunday March 9, at 3pm.

We are now really going live for the next CVWS show. Many of you will have been approached regarding helping either setting up the show or helping while it is running. Please offer a few hours to help if you haven't already.

Please go ahead with your entries as soon as you can. Too many people entering at the last minute can cause the site to crash which is stressful for all of us. If you find the web entry daunting, get someone to do it with you. This helps Lance and the other entry staff considerably.

Now to the art itself. Remember the minimum price you set for all traditional, plein air and open entries must be \$150 and for bin paintings and Mini Masterpieces, \$95. You can bring EIGHT bin paintings but do select well. Don't just use the bins for old work that hasn't sold. This is for good quality work that just isn't framed. Paint for the bin!

Do bring raffle items for Sue Ober to make up into gift baskets. We also would value the donation of white wine that we can use at our Thursday reception. Yes – don't forget that Thursday 5-7pm reception and awards!

And finally, do start to publicize our show. We need visitors to view our art and hopefully purchase! Publicity cards will be at the next meeting in bundles of 25. If you know shops, restaurants, hotels or other venues that will display them do take a bundle and distribute. -- -- Ian Cooke, Annual Show Co-Chair

Exhibition Rules for CVWS 2025 Show

General: Show entry is eligible to all current Paid-up members of the Coachella Valley Watercolor Society.

Allowed: Original art created in the last two years; Art shown at a meeting or 'Painter of the Month'

Not Allowed: Art created in a class or workshop; Art that is a copy or a study of another artist's work (including commercial photography). This is because of copyright laws; Any art that is not original to the artist; Art previously exhibited in any CVWS judged show; Art that is damaged, inappropriate for public display (i.e., nudity), improperly framed, or does not meet entry requirements; Clip frames

Sizes and Entries: Annual Show sizes: Maximum 46", minimum size 5" on any outside edge of frame, canvas or board.

Mini Masterpiece show sizes: Maximum 14" on the outside of frame or canvas edge.

Maximum of **EIGHT** paintings, with up to **THREE** in any category or **TWO** in the Mini Masterpieces.

Each artist is allowed to enter only THREE FULL SHEETS (image size 22" x 30") TOTAL IN THE SHOW.

Mediums: Artwork must be water-media painted in a primarily aqueous manner.

Non-water-based media may be integrated but cover no more than 20% of the artwork.

No oils, water-miscible oils, encaustics, or photography are allowed.

Traditional Presentation Category: Artwork may be presented on watercolor paper, paper-based board, watercolor canvas, Yupo or other synthetic paper. To be accepted into the show and judged, all traditional presentation paintings **MUST** be matted and framed (mats may be any color but must be clean and well cut). No clip frames are allowed.

Plexiglass must be used if frame is larger than 16" x 20". Frames 16" x 20" or smaller may be under glass or plexiglass. Floated framed paintings (no mat) must have spacers to keep art from touching inside plexiglass and be floated on mat board.

Paintings must be backed with foam core, mat board, or other hardboard (i.e., Masonite) no cardboard is allowed. All frames must be wired. Do not pull the wire tight. Wire should be secured one-fourth of the total height down from the top of the frame, looped through D-rings. (No eyelet screws are allowed). Maximum **THREE** paintings

Open Presentation Category: Paintings may be on wrapped canvas or 'cradled' painting panels with a minimum depth of 1½". The sides of wrapped canvases must be staple free and neatly finished or painted. Mats and frames are not required. No glass or plexiglass in this category is allowed. Canvas boards (including clay board, gesso board or canvas) less than 1½" deep must be framed. These paintings must be protected with a layer of medium, acrylic varnish or paint, including sides. All work must be wired ready for hanging. Maximum THREE paintings

Plein Air Category: Plein air paintings may be presented in Traditional or Open format but will be displayed and judged in the Plein Air category. 80% of submitted work must be painted plein air; the remaining 20% may be painted in the studio. The subject may be from any location. Maximum THREE paintings

Mini Masterpieces Category: Paintings must have a maximum of 14" on the outside of the frame edge or a minimum of 5". Artwork should comply with either Traditional or Open category rules but will be displayed and judged with the Mini Masterpieces Category. **Maximum TWO paintings allowed in this category**.

Bin Paintings: All paintings must be original. Acrylics on paper or canvas board are allowed. All work must be matted and backed with clean foam core, mat board or stiff cardboard the same size as the mat and enclosed inside an acetate sleeve that has been fitted to the size of the mat or professionally shrink-wrapped. No cardboard backing or kitchen shrink wrap is allowed. Bin paintings will not be judged. Maximum **EIGHT** paintings per artist in the bins.


From CVWS Treasurer Cindy Mason:


