Eligibility of Artists All artists who are currently CVWS members are encouraged to enter.

Entries Allowed This is one show with four different categories: TRADITIONAL, OPEN, PLEIN AIR and MINI MASTERPIECES. You may enter one or more of the categories. One, two or three paintings may be entered in each category, up to a maximum of 8 overall. A total of up to EIGHT bin paintings may be entered. NOTE: Each artist is allowed to enter only THREE FULL SHEETS (image size 22" x 30") TOTAL IN THE SHOW. Check the detailed show rules.

Entry Fee 1-3 paintings \$40, 4-6 paintings \$50, 7-8 paintings \$60.

Sales All paintings must be for sale. Prices may not be changed once the painting is entered. CVWS will handle all sales and will charge the artist a 35% commission. Artists who sell a painting on the first day may bring a replacement painting for the second day. Minimum price for paintings in the Traditional, Open and Plein Air categories: \$150. Minimum price for paintings in the Mini Masterpieces category: \$95. Minimum price for bin paintings: \$95

Judge This is a competitive show and will be judged by Chip Tom.

Awards

- TRADITIONAL PRESENTATION 1st, 2nd & 3rd place & 6 honorable mention ribbons
- PLEIN AIR, OPEN and MINI MASTERPIECES PRESENTATIONS: 1st through 3rd place ribbons and 3 honorable mention ribbons for each category.
- EMERGING ARTIST 2 ribbons for the best work by artists entering their first show.
- FULL SHOW Best in Show ribbon chosen from amongst all four categories.
- PUBLICITY ART AWARD picture chosen for the 2025 Annual Show advertisements.

Member Contribution

Making the Grade

One of the things to love about watercolor is how using the right amount of water enables colors and values to gradate and blend. Sometimes they do this without our permission, but if we let gravity have its way, some wonderful results can happen. It's an occurrence specific to watercolor and generally we love its effect.

Graded color (a gradual blending from, say red to yellow) is simply aesthetically pleasing and serves to bring a softness into our work. Graded values (a gentle shift from dark to light) subliminally prompts us to travel toward light as we scan a painting. You may not realize this is happening, but gradation is urging your eyes to move.

Gradation helps the eye travel around a painting without solely relying on directional lines, stark contrasts or bold shapes. A graded area can effectively direct us to a focal point without our being aware of it and ad designers use this technique all the time to manipulate their viewers. It is often so subtle that you scarcely notice it.

Awhile back, I spent an afternoon cutting out magazine ads to study the way professionals direct our attention. Commercial artists use a lot of tricks. Yes, bold colors, strong contrasts, and sharp lines are obvious shout-outs, but gradation is in there too, gently nudging us toward the focal area. These designers are masters at channeling our gaze, and we can borrow some of their gimmicks to entice our viewers to look where we want them to in our own paintings.

Gradation is a useful tool to add to your creative repertoire. And next time you open a magazine, see how many ads you discover where gradation helps to focus your attention. You'll need to assess carefully, for a graded patch can be easy to overlook.

Try gradation in one of your own paintings to see its effect. Basic examples might be:

- 1. A graded sky, lighter at the horizon, will bring your eye to the horizon every time.
- 2. A graded darkening at the corners of a painting will help focus your attention on the center.

I could not help spotlighting this brilliant ad. The designers employed it all: Strong color, shape, value, line....AND gradation. They've done everything to keep you engaged for longer than you might have intended. Red draws you in. White shapes subtly suggest faces savoring the aroma and taste of coffee, and warm, graded browns feel like a hug. I'd probably buy this coffee if I could find it. There are several great lessons here.

Maggie joined the CVWS after going to the Annual Show and being impressed with the quality and creativity of our members. She exhibited in the 2023 CVWS art exhibit and won Emerging Artist of the Year! She will be entering again this year.
