Jim is a signature member/past president of both the National Watercolor Society and Watercolor West. His paintings were published in the Best of Watercolor, People in Watercolor and Watercolor Expressions.

His workhops emphasize the importance of selective vision through simplifiation and focus and using design principles to create strong compositions. Jim encourages direct painting, getting the right value and color with the first wash to achieve good, clean color and prevent overworking.

Jim has a special interest in the art of John Singer Sargent (1856-1925). Over the years he has developed an in-depth knowledge of his life and work and has presented slide-illustrated lectures on Sargent's watercolors to many art organizations.



CVWS has a committee person whose sole job is to reach out with condolences, congratulations, and understanding.





My first work of art was at age four. I was languishing in bed with Chicken Pox and bored. Televisions had not been invented yet. My parents were off to a football game and left me with a sitter. Lying on my back I dropped my right hand between my bed and the yellow rosebud newly papered wall. My fingers felt something familiar on the ground. It was a crayon...a black one. I made one little dot near my head on the wallpaper and then a circle around it, then another circle around that one and so on until I was standing on my tiptoes to make the ever-concentric circles until I couldn't reach anymore. Then it suddenly hit me, what had I done. I ran to the sitter who said she could do nothing to help me clean it off. I went back to my bed and waited until I heard my father's footsteps coming down the hall. He brought a chair up to the side of my bed and leaned over and very calmly asked, "What did you do, Joanie?".....without hesitation, I replied, "I was just making a picture of you Daddy!"







I'm Jane Ferris Gillingham. Living in Honolulu in 1939, I saw my first movie, the new Disney film, "Snow White and the Seven Dwarves" and I decided that when I grew up, I would draw and paint for Walt Disney! That was Plan A. I did grow up, but went on to Plan B instead, getting a degree from Scripps, and later from Graduate school. I taught for 24 years in the Claremont Unified School District and at the time, Phil Dyke and Millard Sheets were on the faculty. My first plein-aire workshop was with Milford Zornes, who often told us "paint to please yourself" and "paint for fun!"

In 1995, my husband Gary and I moved to the desert and retirement afforded me the time to continue my love of painting. Here I have enjoyed many great workshops led by wonderful watercolor painters. I paint the things I love: our deserts and mountains, and the animals and plants that live in them.

Thanks for another great season of outdoor painting. I will be continuing my outdoor sessions into the summer months as I transfer to our home in the Canadian Rocky Mountains.


