NOTE: CVWS Annual Show entry deadline is January 29th this year.

Every year on Take-In Day (Feb. 6th, this year) CVWS show entries are delayed by paintings that do not conform to the rules. It's frustrating to both our members and to our volunteers and causes last-minute headaches. **Please read the Exhibition Rules, revised July 22, 2018!**

You will find these on the <u>CVWS.org</u> website Most of these rules have been in effect for many years. We want every artist to be able enter the show, but we must also ensure that our CVWS show continues to be professional! Here's a list of the most common problems at our Annual Show: Double check your paintings BEFORE you leave home.

Framed Paintings

- 1. Any framed painting <u>larger than 16x20, MUST HAVE PLEXIGLASS</u>
- 2. MAXIMUM OUTSIDE FRAME SIZE is 45 inches.
- 3. Backing is required to be foam core, mat board or Masonite, **Absolutely NO Cardboard**, no matter what color it is.
- 4. Your label must be on the **BACK** of the painting, **TOP LEFT CORNER**

Bin paintings:

- 1. Must be <u>matted</u>, <u>backed with foam core</u>, <u>double mat board or hardboard the same</u> <u>size as the mat</u>. <u>No cardboard backing</u>.
- 2. Must be enclosed in an acetate sleeve the same size as the mat.
- 3. <u>Label on front, top left corner</u>

We don't want to hold up artists who have presented their paintings correctly, while offenders hold up the line correcting their paintings. That is why we ask that they go to the work table to make these corrections at their leisure.

Tips & Techniques

THREE WAYS OF DEVELOPING COLOR IN A PAINTING

Three ways to develop and combine colors in a painting are to use: **Hue Contrast**, **Value Contrast** and **Intensity Contrast**.

Hue = pure color (blue, red, green, magenta, etc.)
 Value = the lightness or darkness of a hue.
 Intensity = the degree of white or black added to a hue

Hue Contrast is when the entire painting is mostly all bright pure hues or pure color. The shapes are determined by variation in hue. The values are usually similar. These paintings are usually a lively, cheery, happy type of painting.



Value Contrast refers to the lightness and darkness of a color. The value may range from as dark as black to white. Value contrast is achieved with lots of variation of value. Often value paintings are more neutral colors. You can make neutrals by

mixing complementary colors (those opposite each other on the color wheel) or by adding black to make a **shade**, white paint or water to make a **tint**, or gray to make a **tone**. You may use values of pure hues as well as those of tints, tones and shades to create movement. Use of value contrasts is an effective means of directing the viewer's attention in a




composition. Values that are close together give the design a calm appearance. This will create a more subdued or serious painting. Values that are very different create excitement. It has been said that color gets all of the credit and value does all of the work.

Intensity Contrast Lots of tints, tones and shades and a little bit of pure color in your area of interest make for an interesting painting. There is little value contrast so you see subtle color change. Lots of grayed colors with a few bright or pure hues give the viewer lots to look at and will hold their eye longer.
